## Spiritual State of the World's Children: Summary Table, Panama



Notes: Surveys were administered in randomly selected accessible schools. Inaccessible schools are those in conflict zones or areas of extremely low population, and those that cannot be reached by public transportation. Reported respondents are those who participated in the survey and answered the question. Not all participants answered

all questions. The composition of the sample set—2,222 students aged about 13 to 18, with 56% female and 62% under 16 (population density and gender are proportional to the national population distribution) — indicates a skew towards female and younger attitudes. Data was collected from November 2007 to September 2009. SSWC was completed in September 2009 for OneHope by the Metadigm Group.
